Mass on Wednesday, April 12, 2017 is cancelled. Father Hite & Father Jeremy will be in Toledo for the Chrism Mass at 11am.

Discipleship is not an easy road. There are many challenges in all our daily lives. Responding to them with faithful discipleship is, at times, difficult. Today's Gospel gives us a few prime examples of how discipleship challenges us. Frankly, other than Jesus' call to take up our crosses and follow him, ostensibly all the way to Calvary, I can think of no more difficult or compelling commandment than to love our enemies; that is to pray for those who do us wrong and to seek good for those who hate us. This is one of the great paradoxes of Christianity.

From a human point of view, it is completely counter-intuitive, at any level, this idea of loving our enemies. I am not at all surprised by the vast number of Christians who do their best to keep this idea at arms' length. As long as we don't have to personalize . . . as long as we don't have to put a human face on our enemy we can keep this commandment, even if somewhat vaguely.

Today's Gospel makes it clear, however, that the command to love our enemies is not fulfilled by vague lip service to generalized idea. The Gospel command to love requires us to get down to brass tacks, so to speak. Jesus himself tells us that we must go above and beyond what is required. Turn the other cheek, give your cloak in addition to your tunic, and go two miles even if pressed to go only one. Pray for those who persecute you and do good to those who do evil to you. Love even those who do not love you and, dare I say, love even those who hate you.

In today's world, as though he couldn't possibly understand our modern problems, we might be tempted to say, "Well, that's easy for Jesus to say!" But imagine, if you will, what Jesus must have known and what he must have faced. He took upon himself all the crushing evil of the world; he took upon himself everything, every sin that has separated or will separate us from God. As Paul wrote, "He who knew no sin, became sin on our behalf." (II Corinthians 5:21).

So I don't imagine it was easy for Jesus to call us to love our enemies. I think he knew exactly what he was asking of us and exactly how difficult it would be. In fact, I think the logical extension. . . the fullest expression of obedience to this commandment is to make no room in our hearts for hatred of any kind at any level.

I am fairly certain that this is an absolute commandment, too. If we are going to model our lives on Jesus' life, if we are to be his followers, we are going to have to go against the grain. We are going to have to swim upstream. We are going to have to live in a world that will not recognize us any more than it recognized Jesus and we are going to have to live in a world that will reject us just as it did Jesus. We are going to have to love this world, even if it hurts, even if we are nailed to a cross.

Authentic discipleship admits no exceptions to this commandment. . . not one exception. As Jesus says, by this will we be the children of our heavenly Father. By this will we take up our cross and follow him. By this, having died with Jesus, will we also rise with him. Let the Church say Amen!



MARCH 14 PRAYER VIGIL FOR THE ABOLITION OF THE DEATH PENALTY IN OHIO



Never underestimate the power of prayer! Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Toledo's monthly prayer vigils for the abolition of the death penalty continue. A Candlelight Vigil for Life on Tuesday, March 14, at 7 p.m. at St. Gerard Parish, 240 West Robb Avenue, Lima, OH, with Rev. Michael D. Sergi presiding. After a three-year hiatus, Ohio's plans to resume executions by lethal injection in 2017 are on hold. On Jan. 26, 2017, a federal judge ruled midazolam, used in the State of Ohio's drug protocol for executions, constitutes cruel and unusual punishment. Three individuals are granted stays of execution: Ronald Phillips; Gary Otte; and Raymond Tibbetts, scheduled for execution in February, March and April, respectively. Bishop Daniel E. Thomas urges all Catholics and people of good will to take five steps to abolish the death penalty in the State of Ohio:

1. Pray for the victims of crime, those facing execution, and those working in the criminal justice system;
2. Reach out to the families of those affected by violent crime by bringing Christ's love and compassion;
3. Learn about the Church's teaching on capital punishment and educate others in this vital area of concern by visiting: <http://www.usccb.org/issues-and-action/human-life-and-dignity/death-penalty-capital-punishment/index.cfm>;
4. Advocate for the end of the death penalty by sending a postcard and by calling Governor John Kasich at: 614-466-3555, urging clemency for all 139 individuals on death row in the State of Ohio.
