The new school year has brought a few additions to our faculty: Jackie Harrigan has joined our Theology department; Heather Cooley and Cynthia Scodova have joined our English department; and Samantha

Campbell has joined our Math department. Additionally, Annemarie Mauric is now teaching PE and study skills classes, as well as serving as the Assistant Athletic Director. Todd Perdas has been hired as the new Athletic Director, and he is continuing to teach junior high Social Studies and coach our girls basketball team.

After a year of gathering data regarding our junior high level programs, we made some significant changes for this year. Our 7th grade students will be enrolled in a math class everyday, rather than having math every other day. Likewise, we joined forces with the elementary school to implement a new math curriculum, so there is a stronger connection between the math program at the elementary level and junior high level. All of our 7th and 8th graders are also enrolled in a Study Skills class during the first quarter. This is a calculated effort to give our students the long-term tools to succeed not only in junior high, but also in high school and college. After the first quarter, junior high students that are struggling with grades will be enrolled in a foundation course where they will be able to work on problem areas.

I cannot thank you enough for the support you have given to our students, staff, and school. It is a blessing to be a part of these young people's lives. Please continue to pray for our students, faculty, staff, and parents this year, as we are looking forward to a year full of educational and spiritual growth.

**175<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY NOTES**

In the last column, we learned about the fire that destroyed the second St. Peter's Church in April of 1889. The building was a total loss and despite the miraculous salvation of the statue and altar of the Blessed Mother, nothing else could be recovered. The bell, the organ and all the furnishings were entirely destroyed.

Upon his return to Mansfield the day after the fire, Father Magenhan immediately set about securing a space in which the congregation could worship. The offer of sympathy and a worship space from the Methodist Episcopal Church was courteously declined and St. Peter's congregation celebrated Palm Sunday in the Courtroom of the Richland County Court of Common Pleas.

To complicate matters further, there was still a sizeable debt from construction of the second church, and even though the burned church had only been partially insured, Father Magenhan determinedly went ahead with plans to build a new church. He personally donated the land across from the burned-out church where the original school stood. It was always Father Magenhan's intention to donate that parcel of land to the parish but the fire forced his hand and he deeded the land to the parish the next month.

The old wooden schoolhouse was razed and construction began on a new building that was designed to serve as both a church and school. The worship space occupied the top floor of the new building. Classrooms and an auditorium were installed on the ground floor. Construction was completed in the summer of 1890 and classes began there in September of that year.

When the fourth St. Peter's Church was built (built between 1911 and 1917) the third church was converted entirely to school space and, upon construction of the current elementary building on the site of the old second church, the third church became, for a short time, a trade school for older students. Later, Monsignor Goebel established St. Peter's High School in that building.

Many of our current parishioners attended classes in that building as the current high school wasn't built until the 1950's. If you ask around, there are certainly people in this parish who could tell you a great deal about that building.

By mid-1897 Father Magenhan's health was severely depleted. He took a trip to Europe to visit his sister in France and went to Rome where he was granted an audience with Pope Leo XIII. When he returned to Mansfield that fall, his health, coupled with the strain of the parish debt and the discontent of some parishioners over the debt, caused Father Magenhan to announce his resignation as Pastor of St. Peter's. He completed his service by the end of the year and was succeeded by Father Ferdinand A. Schreiber who had been previously stationed at Sacred Heart Parish in the Shelby Settlement at Bethlehem, where he built the church which stands there today.

Father Magenhan's retirement was short-lived. He died in Cleveland on March 22, 1905. At his personal request, his funeral was celebrated at St. Peter's and he was buried near the great iron cross at the front of the Mansfield Catholic Cemetery. He remains the only Pastor of our parish who is buried in our cemetery.

**150TH SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY NOTES**



Having established the first St. Peter's School in 1868, third Pastor, Father Jacob Kuhn, completed his tenure at St. Peter's Parish in 1869. Father Andrew Magenmann, fourth Pastor, took charge of St. Peter's Parish in September of 1869. With now 200 families in the parish, Rev. Magenmann purchased three lots on the northwest corner of South Mulberry and West First Streets for \$6,000. The purchase was made from the Board of Education of the City of Mansfield and included the First Ward Public School building which became the new (and now second) St. Peter's School. At the invitation of Father Magenmann, two Sisters of St. Francis of Joliet, Illinois arrive in August of 1871 to help staff the school.

## NOT AGAINST US

Like Moses before him, Jesus corrects his disciples' misunderstanding of the gift of the Spirit. They saw people who were not of their company casting out demons and doing other works such as Jesus had done. Jesus points out that no one who does a good deed in his name can be opposed to him at the same time. He goes on to point out the importance of the "little ones,"—the poor, simple people, children, the meek ones who are not important in the world. It is to them that he was sent, not to the wealthy and the self-righteous. He underscores the importance of small works done in faith, as well as big works like driving out demons. "Anyone who gives you a cup of water . . . because you belong to Christ . . . will surely not lose his reward" (Mark 9:41). God builds the coming reign little by little in our actions, however small and unassuming, when they are done out of love of God and neighbor.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

From its earliest days, the Church has had an interest in the education of young people. In ancient Rome, teachers of boys had to resign their posts in order to become catechumens, since the education of boys was so keyed to the lore and worship of the gods. In other ages, public education has been so attuned to other values that creative solutions have arisen.

In late eighteenth and early nineteenth century Ireland, government schools had a goal of "Anglicizing" the Irish in culture and religion. Most Irish Catholics opted out in favor of "hedge schools." In these largely secret schools, meeting not just in the shadow of hedges but also in cottages and barns throughout Ireland, schoolmasters provided eager students with a classical education grounded in Greek and Latin, Irish literature, the banned Gaelic language, and the catechism of the Church. The so-called penal laws forbade Catholics from teaching young people publicly or privately, and "civil disobedience" ruled the day. In 1826, a British government study showed that of half a million Irish children enrolled in schools, 403,000 were in hedge schools! A woman named Nano Nagle defied the law by opening schools for the poor. Eventually her companions became the Presentation Sisters. A layman named Edmund Rice, inspired by her courage, founded the Irish Christian Brothers for the same purpose. By 1820, the situation eased, since Irish Catholics had shown that they would defy any law that diminished their love of learning and threatened their faith.
