CHRIST THE KING (PRELUDE)

Today is the last Sunday of Ordinary Time. Next week we will celebrate the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe – familiarly known as Christ the King. The solemnity of Christ the King was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925, so in terms of Church history, it is a rather recently-initiated feast. The purpose was the Holy Father's response to the atheistic and totalitarian regimes of his era. In terms of that period of history – and through the lens of our time today – we recognize the significance of turning our eyes to our true King. The editors of *Word Among Us* write: "While the feast may not be very old, the truth that Jesus Christ is King of all creation is ageless."

For me, the Gospel readings for Christ the King Sunday are among the most powerful and challenging. This year it is the scene from John's Gospel where Pilate is questioning Jesus. Our Lord responds: "My kingdom does not belong to this world....For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." Last year we heard from Matthew's Gospel about the King separating the sheep and goats. The ones who will be with Him in paradise are those who feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the ill, and visit those in prison. Next year we will be struck by the image from the Gospel of Luke of Jesus hanging in agony on the cross between two *other* convicted criminals. As one of them taunts Jesus, the other recognizes our innocent Savior hanging next to him and says, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Then, in the only Gospel verse where Jesus promises anyone a place in heaven, He speaks these comforting words – not to his Blessed Mother, not to his beloved disciple, not to his apostles – but to the convicted criminal hanging on the cross next to him: "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise."

The Solemnity of Christ the King tells us that the kingdom of God is governed by unconditional love, by a desire for every human being to enjoy life fully and in freedom. Jesus walked this earth teaching how to live and showing how to live. Just as his heart was set on obeying his Father's wishes, so must ours be. Just as he showed love to everyone, even those who opposed him, so must we. Just as he put mercy and forgiveness over justice and punishment, so must we.

Pope Pius XI initiated the feast of Christ the King because he wanted to remind the world that Jesus is the only King. This feast told the world then – and tells us today – that only Jesus can fill our deepest desires for love, peace, compassion, and mercy.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

This article will examine the pastorate of our sixth Pastor, Father Nicholas Hassel, who has the distinction of having served here for the shortest amount of time of any Pastor stationed here.

Nicholas Hassel was born in Avon, Lorain County, Ohio, on September 2, 1870. In his school years, he excelled academically and athletically. In college he was known as an outstanding athlete and even into his middle years, Father Hassel enjoyed participating in athletic activities.

Father Hassel was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Ignatius Horstman on June 4, 1898. He first served as temporary Pastor of St. Peter's in Loudonville and afterward served St. Peter's Parish in Cleveland as an assistant and then as Pastor of St. Phillip and St. James Parish in Canal Fulton. In 1906 he was appointed Pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish in Canton where he remained until appointed Pastor of Mansfield St. Peter's in 1922 as the successor to Father Schreiber. Father Hassel was Pastor here for only ten months when the Diocese of Cleveland transferred Richland, Erie, and Huron counties to the Diocese of Toledo.

Father Hassel made the choice to stay in the Cleveland Diocese and was transferred to the pastorate of St. Augustine Parish in Barberton. By 1925 he had been appointed Pastor of St. Mary Parish in Massillon, where remained until his death from a heart attack on March 31, 1931, at the age of 60.

Father Hassel was succeeded as Pastor of St. Peter's by Father Rupert Goebel who arrived here in March of 1923 to serve as the seventh Pastor of St. Peter's. We will examine Father Goebel's important pastorate in the next few columns.

ENCOURAGEMENT

This Sunday's Gospel is our final selection from Mark for this liturgical year. It is taken from the end of Jesus' teaching in Jerusalem immediately preceding the account of his arrest and passion. In it Jesus gives his disciples hope to sustain them through his passion and death and any persecution or suffering that they would encounter after his resurrection.

The words from the book of Daniel also provided hope and encouragement to the people of Daniel's time. The encouragement in these scriptures is meant for us as well, for none of us will escape tribulation in our lives. Followers of Jesus will be able to endure suffering with joyful hope, knowing that Christ's love will lead us along the way of discipleship and give us eternal life with God.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

November is a month of remembrance for the dead, and cemeteries have long been a focus for prayer. Our tradition holds great respect for bodily remains, since the body was created and redeemed by God, was once the "dwelling place of the Holy Spirit," and has a destiny of life with God in glory. The funeral practices of the early church contrasted greatly with those of the pagans, who had a great dread of the dead body. The ancient Christian funeral liturgy ended with the relatives and friends giving a final kiss to the body. It expressed affection and showed their faith that the grave would not be the last word. This kiss horrified pagans, who thought that any contact with the dead was degrading.

Every year on their loved one's "birthday to life," the Christians would return to the place of their burial to mark their profound communion with those whose lives were hidden in Christ. Typically, they buried the dead with their faces turned toward the east, symbolizing the rising of the Sun of Justice, Christ, at the end of days. They were attracted to the catacombs or burial grounds just as we are today. They would often celebrate the Eucharist at the tomb. Before long, as soon as Christians were allowed to build places for worship, they relocated cemeteries from beyond the city walls to surround the church. This was not so much because the church made the ground holy, but because the bodies of the Saints hallowed the ground on which the church was built, a subtle but beautiful difference.
