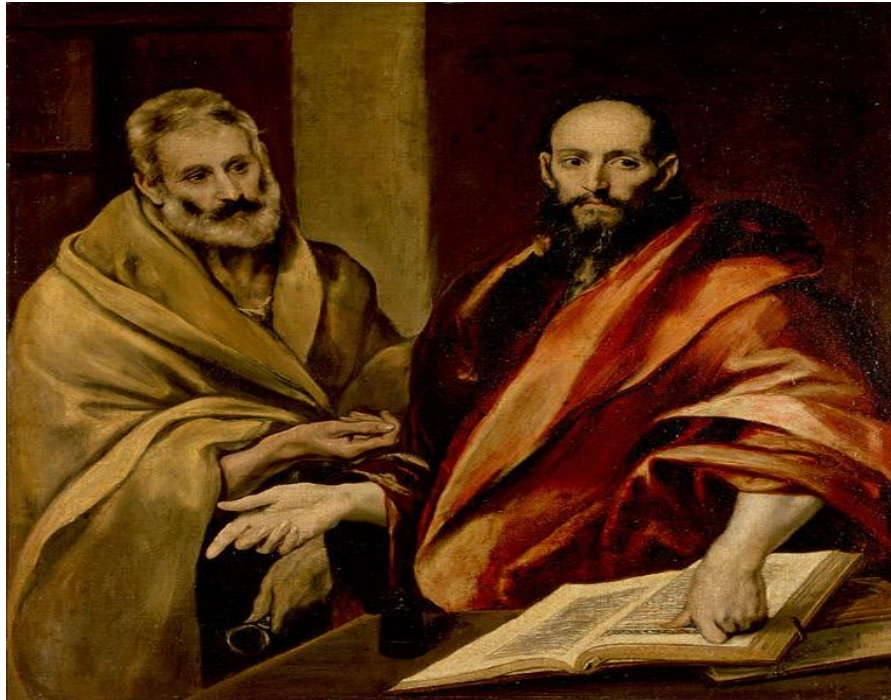

Nowhere to Rest Your Head

This week marks our return to Ordinary Time in the liturgical year, called "ordinary" because of the use of ordinal numbers to identify the weeks. Thus, today is the *Thirteenth* Sunday in Ordinary Time. Behind us is the Lenten season of preparation, the beauty and power of the Sacred Triduum, the joy of Easter, the promise of Pentecost, and the solemnities of the Most Holy Trinity and the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Now we return to the liturgical color of green – and, more importantly, we begin five months of Gospel readings that can transform our lives as followers of Christ.

From this Sunday until the end of this liturgical year our Gospel from Luke chapters 9 to 23 will follow Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. We'll end on Christ the King (November 24) with Jesus dying on the cross and telling the convicted criminal next to him, "Today you will be with me in paradise." In all those weeks from now until then we will be challenged by the specific ways Luke's Gospel depicts Jesus' journey to Jerusalem...and what Jesus asks of us.

Luke puts considerable effort into noting how Jesus communicates with specific groups of people. Throughout these weeks, watch for Jesus' encounter with different groups, such as the crowds, his opponents, and his disciples. As we listen to the Gospel at Mass each week and spend time reflecting on it during the week, we can put ourselves into those different groups. What is Jesus asking of me? How receptive am I? Will I continue following him or will I turn away?

Jesus has a telling encounter with "someone" in today's passage who boldly claims, "I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus responds that "the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." Is he telling us that following him means entering into a life-giving relationship and that personal comfort will often have to give way to the demands of discipleship?

I recall an encounter several years ago on a very cold Sunday morning as I was preparing for RCIA. A young man appeared at the parish center. He looked familiar and when he called me "Miss Lynne" I recognized him as one of our former brothers at Richland Correctional. He had been living out-of-state and was trying to make his way back to his family closer to Mansfield but had no way of communicating with them. He literally had nothing – no food, no support, and definitely "nowhere to rest his head." What was Jesus asking of me at that moment? How receptive would I be? Would I take this opportunity even though I was "busy" with other duties - or would I turn away?

There's much more to be told of this story, but the good news was that we were able to attend to the young man's dire needs, providing food and a place to stay that night. Throughout Luke's Gospel Jesus gives his disciples specific instructions in prayer, hospitality, and suffering. He never wavers from the absolute demands of being his follower. I hope and pray I don't either.

CHURCH HOURS OPEN

Over the past couple of years, we have had a number of incidents of vandalism in our church during the day. Each had to be reported to the diocese. Moreover, during the restoration period of nine months, we had to lock the church due to the scaffolding being up and to avoid injury. Even with the security cameras in the church, leaving all door open all day is not prudent.

However, for those who wish to come to pray, we now have the **NORTH SIDE door of the church OPEN**—(side closet to rectory, so we can monitor through the security cameras in the parish office as well as from the rectory kitchen) during the day. **On Monday and Friday** we will open the door mid-morning and will lock the church after the evening Mass. **Tuesday through Thursday**, the church will be open prior to the 7:00 am Mass and will be locked by 5:30 pm.

We encourage parishioners to take advantage of these times for private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.

MORE EDCHOICE-EDCHOICE EXPANSION SCHOLARSHIP GOOD NEWS

You and all St. Peter's High School families read the good news last week about the additional opportunity high school students in Ohio will now have with the **EdChoice** Scholarship. Students in grades 9-12 for the 2019-2020 school year who are currently attending public or private schools (St. Peter's High School) and who would be assigned to a high school that is on the EdChoice Designated Schools list are now eligible. Mansfield Senior High School is on the list of EdChoice Designated Schools so your child is eligible for the EdChoice scholarship if: (a) you live in the Mansfield City School district and (b) your child would be assigned to Mansfield Senior High School if they were not here at St. Peter's High School.

Here is even more good news we received this week!

The State of Ohio Department of Education will also open an additional **EdChoice Expansion** Scholarship application period beginning July 1. The EdChoice Expansion Scholarship is based on family income *only*, regardless of where the student is currently attending school--public, parochial, or private. For example, a family of 4 whose income is \$51,500 or less would be eligible for the scholarship. A family would be eligible to apply for this scholarship upon admission to St. Peter's School.

175TH ANNIVERSARY NOTES

In this column we will conclude our examination of the pastorate of Monsignor James F. Hebbeler, the eighth pastor of St. Peter's Parish.

As noted last week, the significant changes in the life of the Church brought about in the wake of the Second Vatican Council began to take place in the later years of Monsignor Hebbeler's term as our pastor. It's possible that the celebration of Monsignor Hebbeler's 40th anniversary of priestly ordination (mentioned last week) was among the very last Masses at which the celebrant stood facing the old high altar in the church. By 1966 the institution of the *Novus Ordo* Mass of Pope St. Paul VI was being implemented throughout the Church.

At the time of the Vatican II changes, a free-standing altar made of wood was placed in the sanctuary, along with an ambo (or pulpit) made of wood. The chairs for the celebrant and deacon were, originally, placed on the top step of the old high altar facing the assembly. This was made feasible after the lock on the tabernacle on the high altar broke and the tabernacle was moved to the St. Joseph Shrine on the north side of the church. The seating arrangement for the celebrant and ministers didn't last very long – it was only a couple of years before the sanctuary seating was re-worked.

Monsignor James Hebbeler served our parish for 14 years from 1955 to 1969. He is not as widely remembered as Monsignor Goebel or Monsignor Dunn, but Monsignor Hebbeler's term as was very eventful. He completed the fundraising for and oversaw the construction of St. Peter's High School and Convent. He almost single-handedly built an athletic program that quickly became the envy of other schools in the area and in the Toledo Diocese. He oversaw the reform of the liturgy following the Second Vatican Council. He established a dramatics program for the school and the parish, the impact of which still resonates for us today.

When Monsignor Hebbeler was transferred from St. Peter's, he returned to Toledo where he was appointed Pastor of St. Louis Parish. He served there until February 25, 1972, when he died as the result of complications following surgery. This column will continue next week with a look at the pastorate of our ninth Pastor, Monsignor Edward C. Dunn.

RADICAL TRANSFORMATION

On this Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the readings describe anything but an ordinary time. They are disturbing and they leave us disturbed. The Old Testament reading recounts a young man's radical break with the past to follow a new path. The Gospel describes how life as we know it is abruptly changed if we follow the call of Christ. The psalm and Paul assure us that such life-altering change is possible only because of the power of God's love. We are presented with a stark choice. To love as God loves, we must leave our old lives behind. We must leave behind not just the bad, the selfish, and the evil but the ordinary, our daily work, and the important, our families, our lives. Loving as God loves requires a radical transformation, not a smooth transition.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Processions are life's journey distilled. We move with companions, aware that Christ accompanies us, as we move to the altar for Communion or to the font for baptism, or carry a loved one to a place of rest. In Europe, the season of pilgrimage is beginning now, and tens of thousands of people are moving by foot on well-worn paths. Some take as long as six weeks to walk the last few hundred miles of the medieval pilgrimage route to the Shrine of St. James the Apostle in Compostella, in northern Spain. Those who make the journey by foot, hiking, or by bicycle, have a kind of passport stamped at villages and monasteries on the road. When they present this document at the cathedral, they are given the emblem of a pilgrim, the scallop shell of St. James. High over their heads at Mass, a huge botafumero twirls clouds of sweet incense through the cathedral. Cynics say it is to mask the odor of smelly feet. The pilgrims know better. Seeing through the clouds the happy faces of those they met along the road, they recognize a foretaste of the welcome into heaven, and the joy of meeting loved ones in the Kingdom of God.
