**THE CHILDRENS LITURGY OF THE WORD**

On the road where we live there was a terrible accident a few weeks ago. Essentially what happened, from what I can understand, is that a motorcyclist lost control of his bike on one of the winding country roads in the dark, and somehow ended up in a field. The poor man lay in that field for almost 12 hours before his mother, who knew he never made it to his destination, started searching for him. I understand that this woman took every road that she thought might be plausible that he would take and was yelling for him, when finally, somehow, she heard his voice. They found him, they rescued him, and now he is undergoing extensive medical care to try to heal his wounds.

This situation has haunted me for the mere fact that we are moving houses, and during that twelve hour period of time I must have driven up and down that road no less than 25 times moving things from one house to the other. I never noticed a thing: not a skid mark on the road, not an indentation in the field, not so much as a sound from anywhere that would have struck me as unusual... and yet he was there and he needed help. I went by the next day and looked again all around to see if there was something, anything, any kind of indicator that I should have seen to let me know that I needed to stop and help someone. I saw nothing.

How could someone have been so close to me, literally less than 100 feet away from me, desperately needing my help and I didn't see them?

This was a tragic accident, but I think a similar scenario plays out all the time in our lives. We walk through life so focused on our business, our lives, and our needs that we can walk past people who are so desperately crying out for our help. I myself have, on occasion, needed help and as I made my way through life, wondered, "Can people really not see me, not see what is going on, see that I need help?"

As Christians we are called to search for those people among us, and there are many. Just like the story of the lost sheep, that shepherd gave up everything that he had, his entire flock, to find one sheep that needed him. As Catholics we are called through our Works of Mercy to help, anything from feeding the hungry to comforting the afflicted. Although we are tied to these basic commands, it brings us to wonder how often we fall short. How often do we fail to see that person who needs us, who is literally right there in front of us?

Saint Teresa of Calcutta said it best when she said, "Never worry about numbers. Help one person at a time and always start with the person nearest you." On occasion we need to get back to the basics and remember this awesome challenge that is put in front of us, to live for others as a means to change the world, one person at a time.

## 175<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY NOTES

With this column we continue our look at the pastorate of our eleventh Pastor Father Herb Weber, who served here from 1994 until 2005. Our Pastoral Associate, Lynne Lukach, has graciously agreed to share some of her memories of working with Father Herb during his time here.

As noted in last week's column, Father Herb had a rich background in social justice issues. He even wrote *The Parish Help Book: A Guide to Social Ministry and Faith*. His years at St. Peter's were marked by his interest and leadership in the area of social justice.

In the late 1990's the State of Ohio began plans to resume executions, with death row inmate Wilford Berry scheduled to be executed in January of 1998. Father Herb called together a team of parishioners to discuss how best to peacefully and publicly stand up against the death penalty. It was decided we would hold a Candlelight Prayer Vigil the night of the scheduled execution, standing across Route 13 from the entrance to Mansfield Correctional Institution, where Ohio's death row was located at that time.

Over 30 people attended that first vigil – including Bishop James Hoffman. As it turned out, the execution was stayed for legal reasons; however, the following year we gathered again for Mr. Berry's new execution date. Our second Vigil was February 19, 1999, the night of the first execution in Ohio's modern history. We continued our faithful practice of holding vigil before every scheduled execution, with Father Herb very actively involved in planning, securing proper paperwork, and standing prayerfully with us.

Father Herb was actively involved in prison ministry; he and our associate pastors made weekly visits to the Catholic inmates on death row while it was located at Mansfield Correctional Institution (MANCi), celebrating the Eucharist, hearing Confessions, lifting spirits, and, when requested, walking with condemned inmates to their execution. Father Herb had the profound experience of being the Minister of Record for inmate Glenn Benner and was with him in the death chamber at Lucasville for Mr. Benner's execution February 7, 2006.

Father Herb also spearheaded efforts to reach out in a more global way. He led two pilgrimages through Food for the Poor – first a team of adult parishioners to Haiti in September 2003, then a group of adults and high school students to Jamaica in January 2005. As he wrote in the Oct. 5, 2003 bulletin: *Ten members of St. Peter's Parish, including myself, traveled to Haiti last week. Although I had been there once before, it was still a trip that opened my eyes and ears to the "cry of the poor." And like any good pilgrimage, it was a journey into my heart, making me ask questions about how better live God's call to follow the Gospel.*

In our next column we will look at other ways Father Herb influenced parish life here at St. Peter's.

## HOW GOD INTENDS US TO LIVE

Today's readings are again directed to believers, communities of faith. As in last week's reading, Amos confronts us with a condemnation of those whose lives are focused on pleasure and self-absorption. The psalm contrasts that focus with the Lord's--justice for the oppressed; food the hungry; freedom for captives; sight to the blind; raising of those who are bowed down; loving the just; protecting strangers, orphans, and the widow; and by doing so, thwarting the way of the wicked. Writing to Timothy, Paul urges the pursuit of righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Luke tells the familiar tale of the wealthy man and the poor beggar at his doorstep, who experience life very differently in this world and in the next. We are once again being given clear indications about how God intends for us to live our lives.

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## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Over the past century, a desire to recover a deep sense of unity among all believers in Christ has grown. The ecumenical movement (from the Greek word meaning the the whole inhabited world) began among Protestant Christians, but was given great energy in 1920 with a letter from the Orthodox Patriarch of Constantinople, calling for closer dialogue and cooperation among Christians. In 1960, Pope John XXIII invited Protestant and Orthodox observers to the Second Vatican Council. In 1964, the Council's Decree on Ecumenism named these Christians separated brethren, a huge leap forward from the time of labeling them as outside the Church. A year later, a new pope, Paul VI, and the Orthodox Patriarch officially nullified the condemnations that walled off East from West for nine hundred years. The pace and optimism of the 1960s has sadly waned, and the signs of progress toward unity are few; yet there are wider agreements on sharing Communion among various Christian denominations, and among Protestants agreements regarding sharing of ecclesiastical life and ministry. Among the success stories of the ecumenical movement are greater cooperation among Christian clergy, a similar Lectionary for Protestants and Catholics, and even experiments in the monastic life and common worship.
