The school year is progressing well and our students have experienced a lot of success and growth so far this year. We continue to be focused on challenging and developing all of our students to achieve academically, develop socially and spiritually, and prepare to be of service to our community and the world. Hard as it is to believe, we are now less than three months away from graduating the class of 2020 and we are expecting great things from them!

We kicked off the 3rd quarter by announcing our 2nd quarter honor roll, which included 95 students on First Honor Roll, earning a GPA of 3.5 or higher, and another 42 students on Second Honor Roll, earning a GPA of 3.0 or higher. We also recognized our 20 most improved students, all of whom raised their GPA by at least 0.5, half a letter grade in each class, compared to the 1st quarter. We recognized all of our students that made the honor roll during Catholic Schools Week in January.

As we approach the end of the third quarter, we inevitably start looking to next year. We hosted over thirty prospective sixth and eighth-graders from local schools, including Richland School of Academic Arts, Discovery School, St. Mary School in Shelby, and St. Mary of the Snows School in Mansfield for Come and See Us Day earlier this month. St. Peter's School will also have our annual Open House on Sunday, March 1st from 1-3 pm. Please invite anyone you know who might have an interest in St. Peter's to come in and check out the wonderful things that are happening in our school!

Catholic education at St. Peter's and in general is far more than just well-behaved students achieving academic success. We are here to educate the whole child, academically, socially, and spiritually. While we certainly hope that our students and graduates will achieve academic success, we have an even greater investment in them becoming caring and compassionate people who help lift up each other, our community, and the world at large. I would encourage anyone considering St. Peter's to attend not just because of what they will achieve, but rather because of who they will become.

"During the cold and flu season, our parish has made a decision NOT to offer the common chalice at daily or weekend Masses. Also, some parishioners prefer not to shake hands at the sign of peace. Do not be offended - it is only precautionary. Also, while the priests and deacon would like to shake hands after Mass, we too get sick. Again, it is not that we do not wish to be hospitable."

CHURCH REGULATIONS REGARDING FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Abstinence from meat (beast or fowl) is to be observed by all Catholics fourteen years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products, or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat.

Fasting means limiting oneself to one full meal on a given fast day. Catholics who are eighteen years of age but not yet fifty-nine are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On fast days, two additional smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength. However, the two smaller meals together may not equal one full meal. Moreover, eating solid foods between meals on fast days is not permitted.

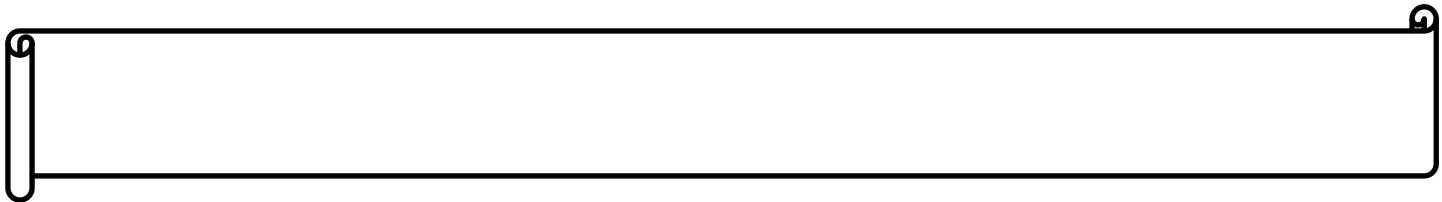

STRENGTH AGAINST TEMPTATION

The first Sunday of the season of Lent always includes a Gospel account of the temptation of the Lord Jesus in the desert by the devil. This year, the story is set against the backdrop of the first reading from Genesis, which recounts the very first temptation by the devil. That story is set in a garden of delight. The Gospel story is set in the desert. As believers, we know that temptation comes our way in our own gardens of delight as well as the deserts of our lives. As Lent begins, our attention is drawn to that temptation within each of us to become like God—we want control, power, and answers to all of life's difficult questions. As communities of faith, we are given this season of repentance so that we can join our hearts with others on the difficult journey of conversion. We look to God and to one another for strength against temptation.

SAINT KATHARINE DREXEL (1858-1955) March 3

Born into Philadelphia society, Katharine was an infant when she lost her mother. Her father remarried and the couple taught their daughters that their wealth was a "gift on loan" to be shared with the poor, whom they fed and cared for in their home. Invited by priest friends to witness firsthand the destitution on Native American reservations, Katharine resolved to devote her inheritance to this apostolate and enter a contemplative order. When, however, in private audience, she begged Leo XIII to send missionaries to staff the schools she was building, the pope replied, "My child, why not become a missionary yourself?" Katharine renounced a twenty-million-dollar fortune and founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, adoring Christ present in the Eucharist and ministering to Christ suffering in victims of racial discrimination. Her Sisters established over sixty schools nationwide, including Xavier University, New Orleans, the first dedicated to professional education for African Americans. In 2000, John Paul II canonized "Mother Drexel," praising her "excellent example of practical charity and generous solidarity with the less fortunate, long the distinguishing mark of American Catholics."
