## AN ANCIENT BAPTISTERY

ONE OF THE MOST ANCIENT AND ENDURING SITES FOR BAPTISM IN ROME IS THE CHURCH OF SAN GIOVANNI IN FONTE. THIS CHURCH IS IN FACT A BAPTISTERY, AND HOUSES THE FONT FOR THE LATERAN BASILICA, THE CATHEDRAL OF ROME. THE EMPEROR CONSTANTINE SPONSORED ITS CONSTRUCTION IN THE YEAR 315, AND IT IS THEREFORE THE OLDEST BAPTISTERY IN THE WORLD. IT IS THE MODEL FOR NEARLY ALL LATER BAPTISTERIES, INCLUDING PERHAPS THE FONT IN YOUR OWN PARISH CHURCH.

This past week we celebrated the Feast of the Epiphany. It is such a beautiful feast and a beautiful story; Three men traveling many miles to look for a baby who was to be the King and our Savior. It is a bittersweet Feast in my opinion because it brings to a close something that took over two months (and for some longer than that) to create. It ends the Christmas season and it is about the time that most families start to take down their trees, put the decorations back in their respective storage containers, and all the gifts that had to be returned have been returned. At this point New Year's Resolutions have been made (and many of them already broken) and our lives go back into the ordinary with meetings, carpools, making dinner and watching the same television programs that we love.

But with the Feast of the Epiphany I always feel like I am stuck with this "now what" question. After all there was a lot of excitement with Christmastime and beautiful celebrations to behold. And, for myself, I always feel a heightened sense of spirituality around Christmas, but "now what" do I do after that?

If considered, the Epiphany brings about a great occasion to reflect. After all, what we celebrate are three men who traveled a long way to see the King. It wasn't by any means an easy or comfortable trip, and they met with trials such as being questioned by Herod about what they were doing and more importantly, why. But, if we allow our imaginations to be ignited with curiosity we can begin to experience what they went through to find God and to get closer to Him.

So we are back to "now what." If the Magi went through all that trouble to locate the Christ Child, what are we going to do to find Him. If they traveled all those miles what are we going to do to try to get closer to Him? And, what will we follow in the coming months as they followed the star? Do we follow our Facebook page more than we follow along in Mass? Do we chase after fun more than we pursue being of service to others? Do we hunt for personal contentment and happiness rather than helping others find theirs? Now what was the question? The real question is what path are we going to take to try to find Christ more in this coming year.

The end of the Christmas Season brings to a close a few months of frenzied preparation for the actual day of Christmas, but this year we should try not to let all that preparation fade in vain. What are choices we can make to "follow that star" and grow closer and closer daily to Christ?

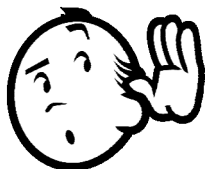

More Hearing Improvements!



If you are one of many of our Parishioners who wear hearing aids, and if your hearing aids are equipped with a "T-Coil" (which may need to be activated by your audiologist), we have a new piece of equipment which may be just right for you! We now have T-Coil Hearing Loops which work with our existing Assistive Listening System. You simply plug the loop into one of our Assistive Listening Packs, hang the loop around your neck and you're ready to go! The loop will transmit the signal directly to the T-Coil in your hearing aids and you'll be able to hear with much greater clarity! 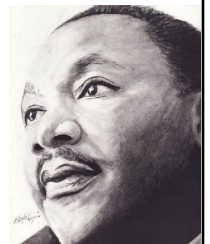

## THE WATERS OF BAPTISM

When new sod is put in, it needs constant saturation with water. Landscapers say that this “knits” the sod to the soil. The same when a branch is grafted onto a tree: the poultice that joins them at the splice must be kept wet at all times. Water is the stuff that binds the very cells of our bodies together. No wonder religions throughout all times and cultures have used it so prominently. When Jesus stepped into the Jordan for baptism, he “knit” himself to what had come before him. By going to the Jordan, he made himself one with the people of Israel who had crossed it into their Promised Land. With John the Baptist, Christ wove himself into the prophetic tradition that heralded the coming reign of God. He had become fully human in the waters of Mary’s womb, and by partaking in the rite of the baptism of repentance, Jesus identified himself with our sinful, frail humanity. It is through the waters of baptism that Christ continues to graft new members onto his Body, the Church; through these waters we are cleansed from sin and filled with the promise of grace, given our destiny for eternal life. ## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the 1560s, the Council of Trent attempted to standardize the widely variant customs for the pastoral care of the sick and dying. We had inherited a practice called “extreme unction,” from the Latin words meaning anointing at the point of death. The deeper tradition, however, is about the prayer of faith that will heal and restore the sick person, and is straight from the Letter of James. The Fathers went back to the beginning, and while not discarding the “extreme unction” name, made a plea for the proper use of this sacrament. As soon as a person is in danger of death from sickness or old age, they reasoned, the time for the sacrament had already arrived.

As a result of this desire, the next ritual text for anointing contained an innovation: a rite for visiting the sick that included readings from scripture, psalms, and prayers. Old customs fade slowly, however, and the quality of pastoral care languished for centuries while people delayed the celebration of a consoling and effective sacrament, sometimes missing the opportunity completely. A priest ministering to a dying and unconscious patient alone in a room has never been the desire of the Church. Our tradition is far too rich for this sacrament to be celebrated in such a diminished and ungenerous manner.

## TODAY'S READINGS
